Paws & Hearts celebrates quarter century of animal-assisted therapy

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It was 25 years ago today, Dec. 1, 1999, that Paws & Hearts Animal Assisted Therapy received its 501(c)(3) nonprofit classification. At the time, I never dreamed the organization would have grown like it has and become such a vital contributor to the health and wellness of seniors in our valley.

What started out with a little stray poodle/terrier named Lucky and an invitation to visit the residents at Valencia Palms in Indio has turned into an amazing journey.

I was so overwhelmed with Lucky's ability to connect with patients that I called The Desert Sun and asked if they were interested in a cute story. As luck would have it, their feature story for the then Desert People section had been pulled, and they were frantically looking for a replacement. They asked if they could come and observe a visit and take pictures the very next day.

Their story put us on the map. We received more calls than I could have imagined.

Lucky and I made presentations to all the long-term care facilities, asking if they would be interested in having a weekly pet therapy visit from a dog. The response was overwhelmingly "yes," so I set out to recruit and train volunteers, both human and canine.

In no way did I do this all alone. My then boyfriend, Phillip Valdez, said we needed a proper office, and together we found a \$400-per-month space in Palm Desert. Phillip contributed half the rent

for years, and his kindness and generosity really keep me going in the beginning.

One day in walked a young woman by the name of Valerie Zugates, who said: "I hear you're looking for a bookkeeper. I'm happy to offer my assistance as a donation." This angel not only did our books but handled our website.

A few years after that, my path collided with Drew Marefos, who was a re-

tired Chevron executive looking for a way to give back to the community. After one visit observing Lucky and Scruffy at Eisenhower, I found him crying in the parking lot. He couldn't believe how two dogs could make people so happy. He offered to do whatever I needed. For almost 16 years he did everything from training volunteers, going on visits with my two dogs and attending board meeting and presentations.

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monthly pet loss bereavement group, which is open to anyone in the valley who has lost a beloved dog or cat and needs a bit of guidance in how to move the grieving process along.
