We managed to get through the summer reducing our 3 times per week visits at Eisenhower Medical Center to only 2 visits. A little more walking, and a little more hopping on the beds, but it saved getting back into a hot car one of the days.

The nicest story *we* (see, there I am including "Scruffy") have to share this time around comes from a patient we visited in early September. She told Dad that a few years ago her husband was in Eisenhower and she had seen us walking down the hall and she approached Dad to bring us into the room.

This woman's husband was unable to communicate and as usual "Scruffy" and I were up on the bed. I layed my head across the man's lap and he whispered the name of his last dog. According to the patient, her husband hadn't been able to speak in months and this was the last word he uttered before he passed away. This woman could not thank us enough for what we did for her and for her husband. (Is there a box of Kleenex anywhere?) What a lovely thank-you she gave us!

Volunteers.....the backbone of non-profits!

Where would non-profits be without volunteers? The volunteer core in the Coachella Valley is one of the strongest of any community, with over 800 registered 501c3's in operation. Every time I attend a volunteer event at Eisenhower Medical Center I am left speechless at the number of volunteers they have and the number of years that some of the volunteers have donated.

In terms of volunteer retention "Paws & Hearts" has a pretty good track record. We still have some of the original volunteers who started with us ten years ago, and every month brings us new volunteer teams. One of the aspects of volunteering with us is the fact that as volunteers we touch the lives of so many individuals who are experiencing challenges, and the visit our Canine Ambassador's provide are never forgotten. Because I wear the volunteer shirt daily, I am stopped constantly by people who share with me their story of the visit they or family members experienced with one of the volunteers and it is heart-warming to hear.

Over the course of the first 10 years I have temperament tested almost 1,000 dogs, many of whom became volunteers. I still get excited when a new dog passes the test and is placed in a facility, and am always saddened when a potential dog doesn't quite make it, because I feel I am disappointing the canine as well as the handler who had the best of intentions wanting to volunteer with us.

Volunteers help to foster community support especially in our case because as a group we are so visible out in the community. We all wear the volunteer polo shirt and our dogs wear the red bandannas. And volunteers lend an air of credibility to a non profit that paid staff can not do. After all, each and every volunteer *chooses* to volunteer and to contribute their time and energy because they believe in the mission statement that the organization has put forward. And in our case, our volunteers are living and breathing the mission statement with their weekly visits!

At 10 years of service we are incredibly well known in the Valley and that is due to the caliber of current and past volunteers. Our volunteers feel very passionate about their dogs and the work their dog is doing and their enthusiasm shines through and is constantly renewing and revitalizing the organization. Your weekly volunteer stories tell of your visit and I smile with gratitude to each and every one of you as I read them.

I have been blessed with having the very best of the volunteers, both human and canines the Valley has to offer and I thank all past and current volunteers for their donation of time, talent and treasure to "Paws & Hearts."

<u>Lucy Curci Cancer Center at Eisenhower</u> Syree & "Cali": Slow start to the day, but it became amazing......got to meet a new patient who is going through a difficult bout with chemo and radiation. She was with her husband and they were amazing people. She loved "Cali", who made her way right into the woman's lap! When she finished her treatment she came back to say good-bye, and hugged me, and thanked me for what we bring in! Great day!

<u>Vista Cove at Rancho Mirage</u> Mary Carol & "Zorro": This was a nice mellow day at Vista Cove. Most patients were very relaxed and there was no drama. "Zorro" felt the calm as well and sat relatively quietly on several people's laps and let them pet him and give *him* kisses! He seems to get better every week.
