Pet Bereavement Support Group

The group is about to start its third year, and we have seen many faces from the valley come into the office and share love-stories of their beloved 4-legged companions.



Therapy Dog vs. Service Dog

In the last two newsletters we talked about what makes a great *Canine Ambassador* and what makes a great human volunteer. Now we should address the difference between service dogs and therapy dogs, something I've talked about before in our newsletters.

Since the start of this year I've received more calls not from people wanting to volunteer, but from people who want to have their dog classified as a service dog so they can *schlep* the dog anywhere they want and for free on airplanes. When I hear this request, like an angered dog, the hair on my neck stands straight up.

There are many people in the world with valid medical needs who require a 'certified service dog,' one who has been professionally trained to assist its owner with special needs—a dog who will work beside its master protecting him or her.

Those individuals who want to cheat the system and slap a *fake service dog vest* on their dog to allow it access to areas not accessible to everyday dogs are doing true service dogs and their handlers a huge disservice.

The difference between a Therapy Dog and a Service Dog is that the classification for each one is something completely different. For the sake of this discussion we will just focus on therapy dogs. Dogs used in Animal Assisted Therapy (AAT) are meant to be taken room to room in an institutionalized setting, such as a hospital, long-term care facility, and cancer center. After a brief introduction of the dog and with the client's approval, the dog is meant to be petted, hugged, give a paw shake, a high-five, and even a kiss. Therapy Dogs are meant to be shared with many people while making their visits.

Service Dogs are trained to be 'in-service' to their handler, and not to be distracted while beside their owner.

Therapy Dogs are given no special preference on airlines, restaurants, public places, etc. They are given entre only to healthcare facilities because they are trained to visit patients. And the way a dog becomes an amazing therapy dog is by repetition--going each and every week on a visit and getting to know the patients and staff he or she will visit.

Therapy Dogs are nothing like Service Dogs, and vice versa.

In summation—if you have a great dog, that is friendly and outgoing with everyone, and you'd like to give back to the community, consider sharing your amazing dog to make people feel better by volunteering with "Paws & Hearts"!
