

You know I was sure this whole Pet Therapy thing was going to be too much work for me, but honestly, I am having quite the exciting life!






Dunkin had to retire a couple of years ago because he had arthritis and getting up and down wasn't that easy for him. He had earned retirement and was quite content at home with his Mom.

Best of luck you two. We are really going to miss you at "Paws & Hearts!"




